





# Introducing the CSEC Inclusion Program

## A \$2 MILLION COMMITMENT TO SPORT INCLUSION

## INCLUSION PROGRAM

Supporting diversity within our communities and the sports we love.



In September 2021, Calgary Sports and Entertainment Corporation (CSEC) and the Calgary Flames Foundation proudly introduced the creation of the CSEC Inclusion Program. This program is comprised of a \$2 million investment in sport inclusion through the Calgary Flames Foundation, along with the establishment of organizational and community partnerships and programs that promote inclusion.

CSEC values diversity, equity and inclusion by providing a welcoming environment internally and externally.

This inclusion fund includes a \$2 million commitment to support inclusion, diversity and equality in sport. The CSEC Inclusion Fund will foster greater inclusion and access to sport for BIPOC individuals, people with disabilities, women and girls and the LGBTQ+ community.

This strategy deploys funds to provide greater access, opportunities and inclusive environments, harnessing the power of sport to improve lives and support underrepresented and historically marginalized people.

Support of inclusion is, and will continue to be, a priority for CSEC teams and the Calgary Flames Foundation.

# Inclusion Program Pillars:

DIVERSITY & EQUALITY—ACCESS TO SPORT FOR BIPOC PEOPLE



## INDIGENOUS MENTORSHIP & INTERNSHIP PROGRAM



above CSEC Inclusion Program

CSEC launched an internship and mentorship program for surrounding indigenous communities and students. The mentorship program provided indigenous youth and students' access to exclusive educational seminars hosted by CSEC departmental leaders on the business of sport and entertainment.

## CREATING INCLUSIVE SPACES

In addition to the two inclusive spaces the Calgary Flames Foundation helped open this year in Siksika Nation and a fully accessible outdoor rink in Parkdale, funding will continue to be provided to sport and recreational spaces in southern Alberta that stimulate inclusion among diverse populations and promote inclusive and accessible spaces.

Examples include:

- Outdoor rinks in indigenous communities
- Sport courts and play spaces for and in marginalized communities
- Inclusive and accessible outdoor rink and play spaces in Calgary communities in partnership with the Parks Foundation Calgary

## INCLUSIVE SPACE HIGHLIGHT

### CALGARY FLAMES OUTDOOR RINK IN SIKSIKA NATION

The Calgary Flames Foundation teamed up with Siksika Health to provide funding for an outdoor rink in Siksika Nation. The Calgary Flames Outdoor Rink serves a population of over 4,000 people with six schools in the area and is the first outdoor rink in Siksika Nation. Siksika Health Services provides comprehensive health and wellness services to Siksika Nation members and surrounding communities. Siksika Health Services' friendship with the Calgary Sports and Entertainment Corporation has resulted in programming and events such as the 'Every Child Matters' Calgary Hitmen Game.

## DIVERSITY & EQUALITY—ACCESS TO SPORT FOR BIPOC PEOPLE

### EXTENSION OF CSEC SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM—CALGARY BLACK CHAMBERS CALGARY SPORTS & ENTERTAINMENT GROUP ATHLETIC ACHIEVEMENT SCHOLARSHIPS

The Calgary Flames Foundation currently provides scholarships at Calgary post-secondary institutions to BIPOC student athletes.

This is also paired with an annual investment in the Calgary Black Chambers Scholarship Program awarded with the goal of supporting and promoting the academic achievements of Calgary's Black students.

### SPIRIT NORTH PARTNERSHIP—MOVEMENT MATTERS

This partnership with Spirit North supporting the program Movement Matters will promote mental and physical health through sport and play for southern Alberta's Indigenous children and youth.

### CALGARY FLAMES LACE UP FOR NEWCOMERS HOCKEY PROGRAM

This floor hockey program runs once a week at YMCAs across Calgary in collaboration with the Centre for Newcomers and Trellis.

Youth between the ages of eight and 12 are encouraged to register for the program at no cost as an introduction to hockey and sport.

## DIVERSITY & EQUALITY—ACCESS TO SPORT FOR BIPOC PEOPLE



### BLACK GIRL HOCKEY CLUB— HOCKEY PROGRAMMING

The Black Girl Hockey Club provides education, scholarship opportunities and community spaces focused on providing Black girls access to hockey.

Calgary Flames Foundation funding will subsidize the costs of playing hockey for Black girls aged 9-18 years old.



### CALGARY FLAMES SPORTS BANK

The Calgary Flames Sports Bank will continue to remove the barrier of accessing equipment by mobilizing the Sports Bank into marginalized, culturally diverse and indigenous communities in Calgary and southern Alberta.

### UMOJA COMMUNITY MOSAIC

The Calgary Flames Foundation is proud to support Umoja Community Mosaic. Formerly Soccer Without Boundaries, this program was founded in 2010 as a drop-in soccer club to help immigrant and low-income children get involved in community. UMC has grown to an organization that provides sports and social opportunities to all.

### THE IMMIGRANT EDUCATION SOCIETY CALGARY FLAMES WELLNESS HUT

The Immigrant Education Society Calgary Flames Wellness Hut is a space that encourages individual mindfulness practice in a holistic wellness space. The space will support mental and physical wellness by offering an array of services that can be booked, including group activities, preventative mental health programs, yoga, music, qigong and tai chi classes, psychoeducational sessions, multi-sensory therapy and youth programs.



## DIVERSITY & EQUALITY—ACCESS TO SPORT FOR BIPOC PEOPLE

### INDIGENOUS SPORT HEROES EDUCATION EXPERIENCE

The Calgary Flames Foundation has supported Canada's Sports Hall of Fame and SAIT on the creation of an Indigenous Sport Heroes Education Experience.

This is a web based multi-media, interactive experience designed like chapters in a book.

The exhibit will share the stories of the 14 Indigenous Hall of Famers for kindergarten to grade 12 students available at no cost to teachers.

## ACCESSIBILITY FOR PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

### LAUNCH OF CALGARY FLAMES PX3 ROLLER-SLED PROGRAM



The Calgary Flames Foundation provided 40 roller sleds for sled hockey clinics in Calgary and launched its first clinic with Kids Cancer Care, Calgary Flames Alumni Tim Hunter and Jamie Macoun, and Harvey the Hound in attendance.

These clinics are a combination of roller sled and on-ice sledge hockey clinics in partnership with PX3 AMP Sports Academy. The goal of the program is to encourage participation in adaptive sports and hockey among youth with existing or recently acquired physical disabilities.

## ACCESSIBILITY FOR PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

### VOLT HOCKEY—CALGARY FLAMES DIVISION



The Calgary Flames Foundation partnered with Variety—the Children's Charity of Alberta Association to present the Calgary Flames Division of the Volt Hockey Program. Volt Hockey is an adaptive variation of hockey that has been designed for children and adults with complex disabilities to enable them to play hockey, a sport that at one time was untouchable for them.

Volt is played in a specially designed electric hockey sport chair for youth six years and up, with severe physical disabilities and limited upper body strength.



